## A SHORT TOUR OF THE BLAZON ARCHIVE

Reaching the 50<sup>th</sup> issue milestone seems to be a good time to talk about one of your branch's projects, the archiving of past issues of the *Blazon*. As the number of issues grow, so does the value of the branch's publication, particularly in documenting heraldry in BC and the Yukon. Preserving this valuable asset, and making it readily available, is of considerable concern to your board.

For the first half of its life so far, the *Blazon* was mailed out to members in forms varying from simple newsletters to high quality, glossy issues filled with colourful heraldry. With the advent of e-issues in 2007, it was an easy matter to start archiving these newer Blazons onto our branch website, a practice still done to this day. Greatly supplementing this growing archive is an on-going project of scanning and incorporating into our website the older, paper issues (issues published before 2007). This project is almost complete, with eight issues left to be done.

Current and archived issues of the *Blazon* had always been for 'members eyes only'. However, in 2017, the branch board decided to release the archive to the general public. (Recent issues – those belonging to the most recent volume – are still restricted to current branch members.) So, what can be found in this archive? What follows is a short tour of what can be discovered within the many pages of our branch heritage, broken down under the various editors.

## The Robb Watt Era (1982 - 1986)

If you are interested in branch history, there is no better place to start than with the very first issue (March 1982) put out by the *Blazon*'s creator, Robb Watt, which documents the first meeting of BC members of the Society. The issues immediately following this inaugural issue follows the birth process of our branch. (In an issue quite a bit later, Spring 2017, there is a summary of this beginning history titled *Branch Beginnings*.) Many of these issues also show examples of heraldry as can be found while travelling in BC.



## The Rean Meyer Era (1997 - 2001)

Rean Meyer was a prolific writer and many of his issues were quite substantial. Some were over 20 pages long and touched upon many aspects of heraldry. The branch's activities and events were well documented in these pages, but he definitely did not confine himself to provincial borders. Rean had his causes, too. He would often take up arms against the misuse of arms and titles. Check out Autumn 1999 (p.9) and Winter 2001 (p.6) as he swings his battle pen.



## The Laurie Patten Era (2002 – 2006)

When Laurie took over the editorship, there was a huge change in style. Wordy articles were replaced with, surprise, surprise, heraldry – colourful, dramatic heraldry on every page. A hallmark of his issues were front pages completely covered by a branch member's recently granted arms. Unfortunately, these issues have not yet been scanned, but they are next on the list. See, below, an example of one of Laurie's covers.

## The Allan Ailo Era (2007 - 2013)

The biggest change that happened when Allan took over was that the *Blazon* would no longer be delivered by Canada Post. The cost of postage had become prohibitive and we were forced to embrace technology. The *Blazon* finally joined the  $21^{st}$  century and became a digital publication.

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The articles were mostly written by Carl Larsen, who was the branch president through much of this period. His articles touched on many heraldic topics. There was one theme, however, that came up a number of times. Carl would take up arms, not against the misuse of arms as Rean did, but against the replacing of perfectly good and properly granted municipal arms with squiggly-line logos. If you are concerned about what is happening with municipal arms, these would be good articles to read. Check out the first one, Winter 2007.

# The Darren George Era (2014 - 2015)

When Allan left to become president of the Vancouver branch, there was a mad scramble to find a replacement editor, at which point Darren George stepped to the plate and, with much help from branch president John Neill, prevented a break in publication. Darren was only editor for a short time until John took over.

## The John Neill Era (2016 - present)

Eventually, John traded in the president's gavel for the editor's pen. Under his watch, the pool of writers widened somewhat, creating a wider range of writing styles and topics. In his first year as editor, he pumped out four issues, which had never been done before. See Spring 2016 for an interesting article on the Von Schuckmann arms. #### HERALDIC STAINED GLASS DOWNUNDER

While I lived in New Zealand from 1970 to 1980, I hadn't been back there for nearly twenty years. I used the occasion of visiting family in Australia to also visit cousins and friends in Auckland. The city has changed quite a bit and it was interesting visiting old haunts, one of which was the Auckland War Memorial Museum. Located in a park domain in downtown Auckland, this large structure is considered one of the finest Greco-Roman style buildings in the Southern Hemisphere. It was built in 1929 through public subscription of Auckland museum. It is not a war museum; it is a war memorial museum and, as such, has a wide variety of cultural and heritage displays that also includes some areas of military remembrance. Around the exterior are 44 WWI battle scenes in the frieze.

I often visited the Museum and recall helping as a volunteer sorting some of the military artifacts to make space for new items. The purpose of my recent visit in November 2017 was to discuss heraldry with Mr. Roger Barnes, Treasurer of the Heraldry Society of New Zealand. I had made contact with Roger before I left sunny Comox and we

arranged to meet. Roger drove us to the Museum and we entered though the new underground parking area and new modern visitor entrance that were completed as part of the recent renovations and developments. We set off to explore the ground floor of the museum, making our way to the

large columned front entrance area (as seen in the photo, above). In the main foyer the light spilled down from the huge heraldically decorated stained glass skylight four floors above. Once on the top floor we got a better view of the skylight details.

Around the four sides of the skylight are arranged sixteen shields of the arms of prominent nations and former colonies of the British Empire. Some of the arms were easily identified, like Great Britain, Canada and New Zealand. Some took a little research to get the right name. Malta was easy, as was India. It was fun getting the correct name for the right shield. The background shadows obscured some of the shield images, such as the one for Gibraltar. Plus there were more colonies not included.

Around the mezzanine floor were various memorial panels and displays relating to WWI. There were also several large maps that showed the principal engagements of the war, and around these maps were the various arms of British dominions and colonies. This made for an interesting collection of colourful arms of former colonies that are mostly now independent nations, and mostly still within the Commonwealth.

The Arms of allied nations were also included in several displays. As a world war, the 1914 -1918 Great War included allied nations not typically associated with this conflict. Below are some of the allied nations' arms from Central and South America.
