In Memory

Late last year we lost two important ladies who helped in the development of heraldry in Canada; both held significant positions in the Canadian Heraldic Authority.

Doctor Claire Boudreau, A.I.H., F.R.H.S.C. (August 18, 1965 - November 17, 2020) Former Chief Herald of Canada and Margaree-Chéticamp Herald Emeritus.

Claire was a Canadian historian, genealogist, and officer of arms. She served as a herald in the Canadian Heraldic Authority from March 17, 1997 in the office of Saguenay Herald and later as Saint-Laurent Herald, to which office she succeeded on the retirement of Auguste Vachon, and then Deputy Chief Herald from December 1, 2005 until June 16, 2007, when she was made the second Chief Herald of Canada following the retirement of Robert Watt, L.V.O., A.I.H., F.R.H.S.C.

A specialist of the science of heraldic emblems and blazoning, she completed a PhD under the supervision of Michel Pastoureau, one of the world's preeminent scholars of heraldry, at La Sorbonne, in France, before joining the CHA. She made history in 2007 by becoming the first woman to be appointed Chief Herald of a heraldic authority. One of her most cherished ambitions was to document the meaning of heraldic emblems as a way to preserve the art while also rendering it accessible to the wider public. As a result, the online Public Register of Arms, Flags and Badges of Canada was created.

Madame Sheila-Marie Suzanne Cook, C.V.O. (February 5, 1938 - December 10, 2020) Former Secretary to the Governor General of Canada and Herald Chancellor of Canada

While born in Ontario and raised in Quebec, Sheila-Marie was a long-time resident of Calgary, Alberta. Sheila-Marie embarked on a long and distinguished career in public service beginning in the office of Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau and ending as the Secretary to the Governor General and Herald Chancellor. Appointed to the role by Prime Minister Stephen Harper in September 2006, she served at Rideau Hall until January 31, 2011. In February 2007, she received her commission as Deputy of the Governor General of Canada.

The blur of daily routine in splendid isolation during the COVID-19 crisis can make the days blend into a "Groundhog Day" sequence. And the seasonal weather can block the sun from keeping us aware of the time going by.

This year is important in the history of our Province. To keep everyone aware of significant events and occurrences the following summary is shown to mark important dates in our national and branch heritage and associated heraldry.

I am indebted to Mr. Gary Mitchell, our branch secretary who checked my list and added several dates:

February 6, 1952 Our Sovereign's Ascension



Royal arms of Queen Elizabeth II

February 15, 1965 National Flag of Canada Day



February 17, 1956 Royal Arms of Yukon approved by Queen Elizabeth II.



February 20, 1982 Founding of the B.C. Yukon Branch of the R.H.S.C. The branch badge was granted on September 15, 2004, Volume IV, page 400 of the Public Registry.



March 8, 2021 Commonwealth Day



March 31, 1906 The grant of arms to the Province of British Columbia. The crest and supporters were later recorded in the records of the College of Arms, London, England, 15 October 1987.

April 21, 1926 Queen's birthday.



June 2, 1953 Queen's Coronation Day.



June 4, 1988 Founding day of the Canadian Heraldic Authority, Ottawa ON.



Grant of armorial bearings on September 15, 1988, Volume I, page 7. Grant of arms (shown above) batons and badges of office January 15, 1994 Volume II, page 281.

13 June, 1898 Creation of the Yukon Territory. Her Majesty Queen Victoria, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada enacts The Yukon Territory Act.

July 1, 1967 Canada Day.



July 20, 1871 The colony of British Columbia joins the Canadian Confederation.

October 25, 1966 The Heraldry Society of Canada is founded in Ottawa ON. By Royal Prerogative the Society was granted its Royal designation on March 20, 2002 and proclaimed at its annual general meeting held in Victoria B.C. on October 26, 2002.



Arms of the Royal Heraldry Society of Canada. The original grant was March 6, 1972 by the College of Arms, London and a grant of new supporters and branch badges by the Canadian Heraldic Authority dated September 15, 2004.

November 19, 1921 The Royal Arms of Canada are proclaimed by King George V.



The same proclamation also established white (Argent) and red (Gules) as the national colours of Canada. These colours had been seen earlier in Canada history as used in the ribbon for the Canada General Service Medal (1866-1870) (below to dexter). They were carried forward to our modern Honours System with the Order of Canada, from 1967 (below to sinister).

Order of Canada (Officer insignia) from 1967

November 19, 1858 Founding of the Crown Colony of British Columbia with the proclamation at Fort Langley by James Douglas, C.B., (later Sir James Douglas, K.C.B.) the first Governor of the colony. This is the first time "British Columbia" is used as the name of the former territory.



December 11, 1931 Statute of Westminster. Significant in our history as a nation as we became a sovereign nation in our own right; it made our parliament responsible as our national authority; the Great Seal of Canada is the symbol of this authority.



The seal shown above is that of King George V and was used from 1912 to 1940 when a new Great Seal was made for King George VI. This was subsequently replaced in 1955 for Queen Elizabeth II, The Queen of Canada.



BLACK HISTORY MONTH

The development of Canada as a nation has been the direct result of the United Empire Loyalists who left the United States of America following the American Revolutionary War (1775-1783). Included in this history, but known to a much lesser degree, is the story of the Black Loyalists who came as well.

In 2008 the Parliament of Canada passed a motion to recognize contributions of Black Canadians and the month of February was designated Black History Month.

Our contribution is to promote Black heraldry in Canada. Here are the arms of **The Black Loyalist Heritage Society**, located in Birchtown, Nova Scotia. The society, originally incorporated in 1991, also operates the Black Loyalist Heritage Centre in Shelburne, Nova Scotia.






ARMIGEROUS APPOINTEES OF 2020 HONOURS

Shown here are appointees of two Orders that reside in our branch area of British Columbia and Yukon and who are armigerous. Shown with their name are their arms and relevant details.

Order of Canada

Daniel Heath Justice O.C., Ph.D., F.R.S.C.

Professor | Arts | First Nations and Indigenous Studies/English at the University of B.C.



Arms of Daniel Heath Justice

Blazon:

Arms - Per chevron its apex a spear head, in chief per pale Gules and Argent, two mullets of seven points counterchanged, in base per pale Argent and Vert a red cedar tree counterchanged; Crest - Issuant from a circlet of birchbark, a demibadger (Taxidea taxus) holding between its paws a miner's lamp and wearing a silver gorget proper; Motto - IMAGINE OTHERWISE

The arms were granted by the Canadian Heraldic Authority on June 15, 2012, Volume VI, page 146 of the Public Registry.

Dr. Justice was appointed an Officer of the Order of Canada on 1 December 2020.

Arms - Per chevron in chief barry-sapiné Vert and Argent, in base Or a double-queued beaver tergiant Azure:

Crest- A log cabin Or flying therefrom a flag Azure;

Supporters- Dexter a mountain goat sinister a Dall sheep both standing on a rocky mount set with fireweed plants proper above barry-wavy Argent and Azure;

Motto- 'S E CALADH AN TEAGHLACH

The arms were granted by the Canadian Heraldic Authority on May 15, 2012, Volume VI, page 141 of the Public Registry.

Mr. Phillips was appointed to the Order of Yukon on December 2, 2020.

Frances Woolsey, O.Y.

A respected Ta'an Kwäch'än elder and a leader in promoting Indigenous culture.



Blazon

Arms- Gules on a chevron Or between in chief two wolves heads erased and in base a fleece Or four wild roses Gules seeded Or and three annulets Gules alternately;

Crest- A demi wolf Or gorged with a wreath of Wild Roses Gules seeded Or leaved Vert holding between the forepaws a rock Sable veined Or;

Motto- GHÀKŪTS'ŲJÌ SHĮ. This Southern Tutchone phrase means "We shall survive".

The arms were granted on June 30, 1989, Volume I page 38.

Madame Woolsey was appointed to the Order of Yukon on December 2, 2020.
